What is a Grant?

Types of Grants

1. Government Grants

Offered by federal, state, or local governments, these grants often support large-scale or public-good initiatives, such as infrastructure projects, healthcare programs, or scientific research. Federal grants, for example, include programs from agencies like the National Science

Foundation or the Department of Education. While these often provide significant funding, they also tend to have extensive application requirements.

2. Foundation Grants

Private foundations—both large and small—often fund projects aligned with their philanthropic missions. For example, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation supports initiatives in global health and education, among other areas. Foundation grants can range from smaller community grants to multimillion-dollar funding opportunities.

3. Corporate Grants

Many businesses offer grants as a way of giving back to the community or advancing a particular cause. For example, a technology company might fund STEM education initiatives. Corporate grants often come with fewer strings attached compared to government funding, but they still require a strong proposal to win.

4. Local or Community Grants

These are often provided by regional organizations and are tailored to meet the needs of a specific city or community. Local grants are especially ideal for neighborhood-focused initiatives, like opening a community garden or launching a local literacy campaign.

5. Individual or Artist Grants

Focused on supporting individuals, these grants are perfect for artists, writers, and other creative professionals. They might cover the cost of producing artwork, attending workshops, or developing that screenplay you've been dreaming about.
